## Dear Presbyterians,

"The Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighborhood." John 1:14 (The Message)

How often do you think about Christmas as Jesus moving into the neighborhood? December is filled with tradition, celebration, and anticipation around the coming of Christmas. In the retail world the Christmas rush has already arrived. We also begin to make lists and search for gifts for family, friends, and other folks in our lives. The lights, beautifully wrapped packages, and cheerful songs all add to the joy of the season. Can we find God in our neighborhood when we celebrate Christmas this year?

To be able to celebrate the gift of Jesus we need to prepare. Advent is the time to prepare for the coming of Jesus, God as a human being in our world. The problem is that Advent is out of sync with our culture. On the church calendar, the liturgical year begins with Advent which starts four Sundays before Christmas Day. On the street, however the weeks leading up to December 25 are the "Christmas season." Advent is the spiritual preparation for Christmas. We prepare for Christmas in many ways and I invite you to take meditative Advent breaks from the busyness of the festivities to focus on spiritual growth and renewal. I encourage us not to run through this season without considering what the gift of the Christ child means for our faith and our lives.

Each week our worship will use a resource from A Sanctified Art, called from Generation to Generation. An Advent devotional is available in the sanctuary to guide us in our preparations for Christmas. And to help us to prepare for Jesus' birth with scriptures and themes that invite us to take a closer at the humans involved in the story of Christmas. I encourage you to take one home and read it every week. The theme comes from Mary's song:

Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name.

His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation.

(Luke 1: 48b-50)

The First week of Advent we begin with There is room for every story.

Matthew 1:1-17 | Isaiah 2:1-5

We begin with Matthew's genealogy of Jesus. We are reminded in the stories of scripture God was able to preserve his promises and prepare the way for the Messiah through the lives of ordinary imperfect folks, like us. How do you see God working in your story?

The Second week of Advent we are reminded God meets us in our fear.

Luke 1:26-38 | Isaiah 11:1-10

The Angel Gabriel comes to Mary and says "Do not be Afraid" in the midst of confusion, fear, and not knowing how to move forward in her difficult situation. How many times do we respond out of fear? How often does someone try to make you act out of fear? Every time a Messenger of God, an angel, shows up in scripture the message is do not be afraid. How can we learn to live in trust and peace instead of acting out of fear?

The Third week of Advent we are encouraged To choose a better way.

Matthew 1:18-25 | Isaiah 35:1-10

Joseph suspects Mary has broken their marriage contract. And yet, instead he chooses not to publicly disgrace or humiliate her. This interruption in his life becomes a holy invitation when the angel comes to him in a dream and says, "Do not be afraid." When he awakes, Joseph has the courage to choose a better way. When have you experienced God's grace because someone chose a better way with you? When have you chosen a better way and offered grace to someone?

The Fourth week of Advent we are shown how we can See God in each other

Luke 1:39-45; 56-58 | Luke 1:46-55

Mary goes to visit Elizabeth and Elizabeth doesn't just welcome her she is filled with the Holy Spirit and speaks a blessing upon Mary as her own child leaps and kicks within her womb. Elizabeth sees how God is at work and names it out loud. She says "Blessed are you among women." Do you see God in the people around you? When we see God's presence in each other it impacts how we live in this world. Tell someone how they have been a blessing to you this Advent!

Our advent worship extends a personal invitation to each of us to walk in the light of Jesus' love, joy, hope and peace. We are also invited to let our light shine, to be a witness to the light of Jesus.

### **SUNDOWNERS**

During this season of more darkness than light some older adults are affected with a condition called Sundowners. It can affect people with dementia and persons without a dementia diagnosis. This is often caused due to a comparative shrunken brain not being able to cope with the daily stresses of life. An individual my become confused or disoriented when the sunsets. Caregivers often notice a change in behaviors. There is no real prevention but there are things you can do to help a loved one. Here are some suggestions from the National Institute on Aging.

### **Coping with Sundowning:**

Reduce noise, clutter, or the number of people in the room. Try to distract the person with a favorite snack, object, or activity.

Make early evening a quiet time of day.

Adjust lighting, letting in natural light during the day, if possible, and try softer room lighting in the evening.
