 Scripture).

- All of those statements are true... though their connection to ministry is, admittedly, a stretch!

As funny or ridiculous as some of those things are, it's hard to overlook the value of little-known personal experiences or hidden talents when serving the Church! Sure, one could argue that the hundreds of hours I spent in college playing Settlers of Catan was wasted, but negotiation, mediation, and planning ahead are skills that are immensely helpful in many contexts! I will say, though, that for our hidden skills and passions to be really helpful in the Church, others need to know what those experiences, passions, and gifts are!

IRVINGTON HALLOWEEN FESTIVAL WELLNESS FAIR

If you recall, IPC conducted many forums and surveys as part of the Mission Study process. We learned of IPC's desire to be more involved and to find ways to serve our community. With the approval of the IPC Session, the Justice Advocacy Team has been working for over a year to bring a new opportunity for us to reach out to our community. IPC has partnered with the Irvington Halloween Festival Committee to host the Irvington Halloween Festival Wellness Fair on Saturday, October 21st from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm. Additional community partners include Community East Hospital, Jane Pauley Community Health Center, Marion County Health Department, ICAN, CICOA, Be Smart (gun safety), The Damien Center, FSSA, Overdose LifeLine, Irvington Public Library, Versiti (mobile blood drive), CIRTA and the Irvington Art Collective. The Irvington Ministerial Association is also supportive of this new opportunity to serve our community and thus our sister congregations will also be participating.

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There will be several opportunities for us to get to know each other a bit better in the coming weeks: coffee hours, committee meetings, phone calls... If you're up for it, I'd love to grab a coffee with you, or you can swing by my office to introduce yourself.

I will warn you, though: I'm going to want to know what your "gifts for ministry" are, too! In fact, I encourage you to find out each other's gifts for ministry. Ask folks sitting near you in worship on Sunday, or find someone during coffee hour you don't know well: What are your gifts for ministry?

And if you don't like that specific question, ask one of these and try to find a way of linking it with an aspect of our life and ministry at IPC:

- What is the biggest adventure you've ever been on?
- What is your most embarrassing experience?
- Tell me about a time when you felt like you were making a difference.
- What is the most surprising fact about you that no one at Church would guess is true?
- What was your favorite thing to do as a child?
- What is something you are very proud of?

Let's get to know each other!



PS - Name tags are also very helpful. Did you know that you can get a church name tag, too? Simply ask an usher on Sunday morning or the office during the week. They cost \$5 but members get their first one free! (Not a member? Ask me about how to become one!)

CONGRATULATIONS, MOHAMMED!


Monday, September 18 was a day of long-awaited celebration for the Alhamwi Family. Mohammed graduated

humble response was that it wasn't





I found this study to be interesting called, 'The One Percenters Age Group. You are the smallest group of children born since the early 1900s. You are the last generation, climbing out of The Depression, who can remember the impact of a world war that rattled the structure of our daily lives. You remember ration books for everything from gas to

sugar to shoes to stoves. You saved tin foil. You remember milk being delivered to your house in the morning and put in the milk box on the porch. Parents and teachers used discipline. The last generation without television. The radio was your news. Without television, you played outside. You really didn't know what the world was like. In the 1950's we got tv, black and white, three stations and no remote.

Computers were called calculators. You pounded on typewriters and changed the ribbon. There were newspapers for adults, you got the comic pages.

Polio was still a crippler. You came of age in the 1950s & 1960s. More than 99% of you are retired and should feel privileged that you lived in the best of times. If you were born between 1930 and 1946, you have outlived 99% of all people in the world born between those years.
