much to us throughout the year. May the Peace of Christ Be With You!



Rain Garden

The Board of Trustees has approved a contractor to build a rain garden on the south edge of the parking lot alongside Julian Avenue. The garden will collect water from the parking lot, keeping it from draining onto the street. Session suggested this rain garden as an environmental effort to keep oils and chemicals from the asphalt from ending up in our waterways. Many thanks to IPC member, Pat Stout, who provided expert assistance in the design of the garden.







The rain garden will be funded from the Karl Dickerscheid bequest and will be known as the Karl Dickerscheid Memorial Rain Garden. Jack Simpson, IPC member, explores the archives for stories of the church, its past members and other bits of interesting information and lore. I sat down with Rev. Heimach and asked him how he prepares his sermons. He told me that after his Sunday sermon, he clears his mind of sermons until Tuesday. Then, on Tuesday morning he sits down and looks at the four scriptures of the universal lectionary (the three-year calendar of scriptures for each

Sunday, made up of the Old and New Testaments, a Psalm and a Gospel.)
He then picks which scripture he will base the sermon on, and he considers any current events that he might be able to tie into. On Wednesday he begins to work on the opening of the sermon. The opening is very important as it tries to capture the attention of the congregation. After

he completes writing this introduction, he knows the direction the sermon will take.

Early Thursday morning, when the church is quiet, he writes for about 3 hours and finishes the heart of his sermon. As he writes, he speaks it out loud because a sermon is meant to be spoken. He says it must sound right, sentence by sentence, while lasting around 15 minutes long. It will be 90% done by noon.

He finishes writing it Friday morning. On Saturday evening, he tries to memorize it so he does not have to read it word for word. On Sunday morning he goes over it again at home and then gets to the church early, and goes over it again. His goal is to seek God's Word and provide meaning, while also holding the congregation's attention. He has done this for 34 years and is still finding new things with his preaching.

I asked, "Do you ever reuse old sermons?" and he answered "Never." I also asked if all the sermons he ever preached are kept at IPC. He said since computers, Yes, but before that time, No. He says sermons are relevant to a specific time and day, like food at a meal. Afterwards they are just leftovers and don't taste quite so good.
