The project led by the PTSA of George W. Julian School #57 has applied and received a matching grant of up to \$50,000 from the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority's CreatINg Places program. The campaign is accepting donations now until June 22, 2022.

Pentecost was the first manifestation of the Spirit in the new Church. Pentecost was the day when the Holy Spirit gave believers not just the ability to speak

clearly, but most amazingly, to hear clearly what other people were saying. Anytime we understand one another, we can be sure God is involved.

Pentecost is considered the birthday of the Church. A symbol of the church is a boat. The sermon will discuss how the Church is a "ship and not a boat." Join us on this day of celebration.

On May 19th, PWC met for lunch and a program to celebrate the long history of women's organizations at IPC and to take a new direction of study, fellowship and service. Women began organizing at IPC as early as 1908 with four separate groups which unified in 1932 to form the Women's Association, which ultimately became the Presbyterian

Women in the Congregation (PWC) in the seventies. Facing dwindling attendance and difficulty in carrying out the PW mission, on March 17, 2022, PWC voted to no longer meet under the National PW umbrella but form a Women's Bible Study, continuing study and fellowship as circles have done for decades. At the final PWC meeting, outgoing Moderator Betty Thomas received the PW Life Membership for her service to the church and its women. The meeting concluded with the tradition of saying the Mizpah Benediction and the hope that IPC women find direction through the new Bible study to continue God's work in the church and community.


GRADUATION SUNDAY



UNDERSTANDING JUNETEENTH

JUNETEENTH celebrates that date (June 19) in 1865 when the Union troops landed in Galveston, Texas. General Gordon Granger announced the end of the Civil War and his intention to enforce the Emancipation Proclamation that had been the law for two and a half years (signed on January 1, 1863). In fact, Robert E. Lee had surrendered at Appomattox more than two months earlier on April 12, 1865, but the news had not reached the people of Texas - nor had the slaves in Texas heard about the Emancipation Proclamation.

The slaves had been legally freed, but they didn't know it. Then on June 19, 1865, slaves in Galveston rejoiced in the streets. Juneteenth celebrations spread across Texas the following year and have since spread across the



nation. Festivities then and now often open with prayer and religious ceremonies, followed by music and dancing and contests of all sorts. The reality of their freedom was reason to celebrate. JUNETEENTH is the day when the hidden reality of their freedom was finally revealed.

We remember this day because there remains unspoken and unrecognized bondage for people of color, e.g., a Black person is 17 times more likely to receive a prison term for the same crime committed by a White person. As a congregation dedicated itself to racial equality, we know we can do more to level the field for people of all races. Together in Christ,



INTERIM MINISTRY PROGRESS REPORT

We are moving along in the process of searching for a new pastor. This winter and spring we collected the answers to several congregational surveys. We also held three important Neighborhood Forums in which we heard from a dozen members of the larger Irvington community. Now, we have an ad hoc group of church members, led by elders Kathy Moorhead, Chuck Marion, and T.J. Hengst, who make up the Mission Study Task Force (MSTF). They will deduce what the surveys tell us about our church and how the wisdom of the local leaders will inform our mission.

The MSTF will articulate a description of IPC:

- Our congregation consists of "these" kinds of people (economics, ages, needs, issues) who believe "this" about our church (what we appreciate about our church) and "what" we should do in the Irvington neighborhood.
- We live in a wider Irvington neighborhood consisting of "this" demographic of people (economics, ages, needs, issues). We believe they might be attracted to "these" kinds of ministries.
- With that in mind, what do we need in the way of staffing to match the interests of our church with the needs of Irvington?
- All of this above information is necessary to create the Mission Information Form (MIF). The MIF is the document Presbyterian PNC's use to search for pastors.

Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC)

On Sunday, June 12, the Congregational Nominating Committee will start deliberations on who might constitute the PNC. The PNC should represent a wide selection of church members.

I suggest the PNC be made up of 9 members. If a couple people cannot make a meeting, the PNC can continue unabated.

Being on a PNC is demanding. The members should be willing to meet at least twice a month for a year. If all goes well, the church will actively begin seeking a new pastor by early fall.

This is a wonderful congregation. You will have many candidates to consider.

I came across some JACK'S interesting western facts: **Boot Hill Cemetery -- The** first one was in Dodge City, Kansas, for people that come to a sudden end.



Little Sure Shot was the name given to Annie Oakley by Chief Sitting Bull. She spent 17 years with Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. The Pony Express only lasted 18 months before going bankrupt due to the telegraph. Barbed wire stopped the cattle drives. It closed off the open range. Doc Holliday graduated from Pennsylvania College of Dental Surgery. He moved to Dallas, Texas to set up practice. He found that drinking and poker were better than pulling

teeth. He headed west for his health for he was suffering from tuberculosis. He became excellent with a gun. He was in the **Gunfight at the OK** Corral, which lasted only about 30 seconds. He also killed Johnny Ringo in a gun fight to save Wyatt Earp. These events took place in Tombstone, Arizona. The Earp's along with Doc Holliday enforced the law mainly against outlaw ranchers.
