IPC is not involved with the renting of apartments. IPC has donated boxes of sheets, pillowcases, towels, a couple of blankets, and a bag of personal items that included toothbrushes. IPC INCONVERSATION: HOSTING "A FEVER IN THE HEARTLAND"

On Tuesday, November 14th, IPC provided the space for an event hosted and organized by Indiana Humanities, a non-profit organization with the mission of encouraging reading and open discussion. Author Timothy Egan discussed his newest work <u>Fever in the Heartland: The Ku Klux Klan's Plot to Take Over America, and the Woman Who Stopped Them.</u>

Nearly 275 people gathered in the Sanctuary to listen as journalist Adam Wren facilitated the session about past Irvington resident and Klan leader D.C. Stephenson's meteoric rise to power and his subsequent arrest, trial, and conviction for the abduction and murder of Madge

JACK'S AARP Bulletin,

Jack Simpson, IPC member, explores the archives for stories of the church, its past members and other bits of interesting information and lore.

While reading the I ran across an article "Super Agers". These are people in their 80s and 90s that have exceptional memory. Less than 10% of those who think they have it, don't. One secret is they control their blood sugar and blood pressure. They control both through medication and eating a high-nutrient diet. Older adults should eat

whole grains, veggies, nuts, leafy greens, berries, and fish. This slows brain aging by 7.5 years. Number 2 is older adults who talk with others every day have less brain shrinkage in key

brain areas than those who have less contact with friends. Number 3: avoid stress and prioritize mental health. Depression doubles the risk for



dementia. A study also found stress levels had a 37% higher risk for memory problems. Another study found that older adults with depression who got treatment, including medication and talk therapy, were up to 32% less likely to develop dementia ever 10 years than those who didn't.
