ADVENT: FROM FEAR TO FAITH

In every Indiana Jones movie, there is at least one scene where Harrison Ford's character—who has been relatively unfazed by all the weapons, "bad guys," death-defying stunts, disasters of varying degrees both manmade and natural—encounters the one thing that nearly cripples him with fear. "Snakes. Why did it have to be snakes?!" Even Indiana Jones has a fear of something.

What do you fear? We all fear something. We all have experiences or thoughts that associate with a person, place, thing, situation, or concept—and most of us have several—that stirs within us a fight-or-flight reaction; that cranks our anxiety up from a low simmer to a hard boil instantly; that makes us queasy, causes us to freeze, or triggers reactionary responses that are grounded in irrational thinking.

Advent is the liturgical season of preparation for the arrival of the Messiah. The Messiah's arrival necessitates the existence of a world that needs a savior. The first verses of Luke's gospel succinctly sets the political stage that identifies the fear-filled situation of God's people when he writes, "In the days of King Herod of Judah..." God's people had been living under the ruthless oppression of the Roman Empire, where they lived in ruthless, unending, back-breaking, soul-crushing, inescapable poverty, oppression, depression, and fear. Fear of the authorities; fear of death; fear of despair; fear of brokenness...

The thing about living in such a state of fear is that the faintest glimmer of hope can shine so brightly amidst the darkness of fear.

As we meander through this Advent season—through these darkest days of the year and through the spaces of life where darkness feels most consuming and disorienting—we will be doing so asking, What do you fear? As we ask that question, we will confront it with the words of hope we find proclaimed by God's messengers over and over again.

Tie One On for the Christmas Joy Offering On Sunday, December 21st, we will have the opportunity to dedicate gifts to the churchwide Christmas Joy Offering as we "tie one on" to the Christmas Tree that we bring in for the time of offering during our morning worship.

The Christmas Joy Offering is the oldest of the churchwide Special Offerings, starting as a collection in the 1930s that supported retired ministers who were experiencing financial difficulties. Today, the offering continues to do the work of supporting leaders of the Church who are in financial need: 50% of the offering provides scholarships and financial aid to future leaders of the Church, specifically those in communities of color where local leadership needs are highest; and 50% is directed to support current and retired ministers and church workers who are in financial need through the Board of Pensions' assistance programs.

On behalf of my colleagues and peers across the denomination who have received from the Christmas Joy Offering over the last 85 years, thank you for your generous and faithful support!

The Three Sisters of the First Thanksgiving

The IPC Justice Advocacy Team and the Irvington Branch of the Indianapolis Public Library partnered to host our fifth Community Read event on November 10th. The book shared was Keepunumuk: WeeAchumun's Thanksgiving Story by Danielle Greendeer (Mashpee Wampanoag), Anthony Perry (Chickasaw), Alexis Bunten (Unangan/Yup'ik) and beautifully illustrated by Garry Meeches Sr. (Anishinaabe).

Aeriel Lewis along with other members of the JAT invited the children to create "squash, corn and beans" to complement their understanding of the book. Each child was given a copy of the book to share with their families this Thanksgiving

season. Aeriel shared that "This book is about the first Thanksgiving from the perspective of three Wampanoag sisters. It tells the story of newcomers coming to the land of the first people. It speaks of the language of the land, shared between first people, animals and plants. It speaks of helping the newcomers learn to care for the land they now share. It speaks of the very different stories we hear in schools. A great look at the holiday through a unique lens."

Alzheimer's Support Groups for Caregivers continue to take place here at Irvington monthly on the 2nd Tuesday in the parlor at 1 p.m.




Our next book selection

HORIZON HOUSE NEEDS


It is getting cold outside!

O R N E Pancakes! What kid doesn't like pancakes? Adults enjoy them too. Does anyone realize how old they are? 30,000-year-old grinding tools show that Stone Age cooks made flour to create a primitive form of flatbread, similar to a pancake. Records

indicate that ancient Greeks and Romans sweetened pancakes with honey; we also know that the British ate pancakes during the Elizabethan era. They often included rose water, sherry, ale, eggs, and butter, or any combination. Even Shakespeare mentioned pancakes in his play *As You Like It*. These pancakes were traditional pancakes eaten on Shrove Tuesday—the day before Ash Wednesday in the Christian calendar—which were made with beef and dipped in mustard.
